Research interests

In her role as obstetric epidemiologist, and for many years as lead for the Aberdeen Maternity and Neonatal Databank, Sohinee's personal programme of research focused on the epidemiology of pregnancy loss and the long-term health outcomes of pre-eclampsia. Sohinee led multiple historical cohort studies and systematic reviews, and facilitated various individual patient data meta-analyses. Sohinee's work regularly featured in high-impact journals and influenced national guidance on pregnancy-related topics. Sohinee was passionate about public engagement and was regularly seen sharing the message that 'data saves lives'.

The Power of Collaboration

Sohinee was a shining example of the power of collaboration, supporting colleagues, trainees and students. She will be remembered by many as an extremely supportive collaborator who made many projects possible through her knowledge of Scottish datasets, of data linkage and permissions processes. Her network of collaborators spans the UK and worldwide. She worked with many researchers at the University of Edinburgh and across Scotland. Sohinee facilitated projects on sepsis and postpartum haemorrhage at the National Perinatal Epidemiology Unit in Oxford, where co-authors described her as 'an exceptional epidemiologist with a deep and rich understanding of the databank, its strengths and limitations,

Her insights and advice left a lasting impression, and her passion and drive for high quality research have inspired these individuals in their subsequent careers.

Sohinee was passionate about Global Women's Health. She played a key role in the organisation and delivery of the Global Health MSc course at the University of Aberdeen, sharing the importance of epidemiological research in diverse settings and supervising MSc student projects.







Sohinee is also remembered as a kind, gentle woman with a great sense of humour, an excellent cook and a doting mother to her two boys. She met her husband Bhatty (Professor S. Bhattacharya) at medical school, and their journey took them from Calcutta to Aberdeen via a short stop in England.
