New CSO funded Study

The "PROTEA" study. PROgesterone for ThrEAtened Miscarriage: A Prospective **Cohort Study in Scotland**



PI: Dr Andrea Woolner (Aberdeen Centre for Women's Health Research, University of Aberdeen)

Co-applicants: Prof Siladitya Bhattacharya, Dr David McLernon, Prof Graham Scotland (University of Aberdeen), Prof Colin Duncan (University of Edinburgh) and Ruth Bender Atik (Miscarriage Association). Funding granted = £299,875.

Bleeding in the earliest stages of an ongoing pregnancy is known as threatened miscarriage. The hormone progesterone has been shown to reduce the risk of pregnancy loss in women who have had one or more previous miscarriages but is not equally effective in all women. In this research, we aim to use hospital records from all Scottish hospitals to study how well progesterone works in terms of preventing miscarriage and what additional NHS resources are needed to support this service. Application for study approvals (PBPP, Public Benefit and Privacy Panel for Health and Social Care) are pending, but when approved we intend to ask all health boards in Scotland if they would be willing to share data from Badgernet or Trak maternity (NHS Lothian) to contribute to this prospective cohort study.

The PROTEA team will be in touch soon with individual health boards once approvals are in place and we would love to have your support to undertake this valuable research
